Tofu was the most frequently used as miso-soup, yudohfu and shiraae etc. On the potatoes, jagaimo was the most frequently used as salad, curry, and nikujaga. The special dishes for the traditional events were cooking of azuki beans such as sekihan, zenzai and ohagi etc.</p>

We conducted a survey to the students attending a domestic helper course in second stage offered by Kobe Women's Junior College. We inquired their motives for attending the course and examined their knowledge about a domestic helper before they attended the course. We also examined the extent of their satisfaction and the change of their consciousness brought by attending the course.

According to the results of the questionnaire, most of the students attended our extension course for taking a position as a domestic helper. They could obtain new knowledge and skills through learning and practicing in our course. Furthermore, they could be aware of a favorable change that occurred in their minds. They came to behave more warmly and hospitably toward elderly people in their everyday lives.

Report on Actual Conditions of Life-style and Diets of Children

In order to investigate on the actual conditions of life-style and diets among children, the present study obtained information by means of questionnaires from their guardians.

As results, the following problems were shown. About 40% of children go to sleep after 10 pm. They wake in a bad temper, and some of them have low temperature or no good appetite in the morning. Regarding the mastication, many children do not care much tough food and have weak mastication power. Some children were in poor health condition during childhood. In regards to diets, many children like much meats, but take poorly fishes, been products and vegetables. Furthermore, compared with constant vigorous children (Group G) and poor healthy ones (Group N), the children of group G eat much fishes, been products and vegetables.

This indicates a clear relationship between diets and healthy conditions of children.

The effect on the hardness and taste of pickled fish with corn and cider vinegar were investigated.

The hardness of fish pickled with cider vinegar was lower than pickled with corn and rice vinegar.

As for the organic acid, the hardness of fish pickled with Malic Acid was lower than with Acetic and Citric Acid. Especially, the difference of hardness between Malic Acid and Acetic Acid were showed significant increase.

The hardness of fish pickled with vinegar added sugar was changed. But it was not found difference during 5~20% sugar.

On the sensory evaluation the significant difference was not recognized with corn and cider vinegar
